She stated that she had to get "rid" of it because she had just redecorated her house and the dog no longer "matched" her décor – oh, and, did we "have one in white?" The dog was nothing more to her than a home accessory – a throw pillow with legs. And, as surprising as her attitude may seem, a home decorating program on television recently recommended using fish as "accessories" for home décor.

Pets and other animals are *not* home furnishings or accessories. They are living beings that should be respected as such. When treated with love and care they return our emotional investment many times over and provide us with wonderful companionship. They deserve better than to be treated as commodities, such as decorating accessories.
